Second Split Term - Classes begin July 19	
Withdrawal/Class drop dates	Refund percentage
July 19, 20, 21	75%
July 22, 23	50%
July 26, 27	25%
July 28 or later	NO REFUND

NOTE: Refunds for dropped classes are given only in TOTAL hours left after drop falls below 10 quarter hours.

Any withdrawals/drops prior to 1st scheduled meeting of any class for which a student is registered, qualifies for a 100% refund.

EXCEPTIONS TO THESE DATES AND PERCENTAGES WILL BE MADE ONLY IN EXTENUATING CIRCUMSTANCES AND PERMISSION OF THE DEAN OF THE JUNIOR COLLEGE DIVISION.
